YEOVIL & DISTRICT CHYSANTHEMUM & DAHLIA SOCIETY LATE SHOW REPORT



Yeovil & District Chrysanthemum and Dahlia Society held their open late show the weekend of 16th & 17th November. 52 entries were recorded and the quality of blooms was exceptional.

The Supreme Championship was won by Ivor Mace with his entry of *Rita Fox, Mancetta Symbol* & *Jessie Habgood*. Ivor was awarded the Hamblet Trophy for Best Vase in Show for *Jessie Habgood* along with the NCS Silver medal. Ivor Mace's wonderful entry of 6 large exhibition won him The Aldon Cup. The entry was made up of *Jessie Habgood*, *Cream Jessie Habgood* & *Primrose Jessie Habgood*.

The Denning Cup is awarded to the best exhibit in Class 3 – 6 Blooms Medium Exhibition. This was won by Harry Godden for his entry of *Lundy, Trident & Phenoux*. Harry Godden won the Brigham Cup for his entry of *Peach Fairweather* x2 and *Mancetta Symbol*. Harry was also awarded the Show Committee Cup for the most points gained in the show.

The Diment Rose Bowl for 3 vases with 3 blooms of incurved was won by Steve Wilcox for his entry of *Fairweather & Salmon Fairweather*.

The Arthur Bicknell Memorial Trophy was also won by Steve Wilcox. This class contained Steve's entry of *White Fairweather* & *Doreen Statham*. Steve also won Class 9 for 5 incurved with a vase of *Fairweather*, and he was awarded the NCS Bronze Medal for this entry. The judges awarded Steve Wilcox the NCS Certificate of Merit for his entry of 5 *Doreen Statham* in Class 13.

The singles classes were supported by 3 exhibitors. Chris & Jill Bond won the O.A. Wiles Builders Trophy for their entry of 3 vases of small/medium singles. The entry was *Brierton Sunset, Shirley Dyer & Mustard Pot*.

The Joyce Trophy for the best vase of singles in the show was awarded to Mark Hatcher for his entry of *Primrose Kath Stevenson.*

The anemone championship for the Hawes Cup was won by Harry Godden for his entry of Anderton Gold.

Unfortunately, we did not have any entries of sprays or fantasies.

NEW DAHLIAS GROWN FOR THE 2024 SEASON by Neal Hatch

A quiet year for me on the new dahlia variety front. *Blyton Red Ace* is a new (to me) miniature ball that I enjoyed seeing exhibited by someone else at our 2023 show. It's been a great addition to the plot and I aim to grow it again in 2025. I found it a little on the small side, so must grow fewer stems on it next year. It seemed to hold up well against the weather.

Blyton Stella (miniature decorative) was also a dahlia I saw others growing in 2023, and so joined my stable in 2024. It has been quite late flowering and seems a delicate plant with fairly small flowers. As it is fairly short it stood up well to the wind. It

looks stunning and I will certainly be growing it again in 2025.

I tried *Tracy Diane* (small decorative) this season. And, just as with all the other *Dianes* I have tried, I found out that I can't grow it! It had the same tendency to weedy/weak stems that I get with all the *Dianes* (despite some potash feed).

I tried the new introduction from Halls - *Hillcrest Charlie* (medium semi-cactus). It looks promising despite flowering (uncovered) during some atrocious weather. It made a couple of outings for me after my main batch of *Ryecroft Helen's* had finished. I would certainly grow it again, alongside my banker in this classification – *Ryecroft Helen*.

I tried some different pompons this year, but with little success. *Winkie Lambrusco* was late and it seems very large for a pompon. *Rhonda* & *Willos Borealis* suffered in the early dry conditions and were open-centred. *Small World* did produce a few vases for me, and I would give it another try – especially after seeing some of Graham's fabulous blooms.

Following Roger's success with dahlias like *Fred Swabey* and his sport of *Roger's Choice*, I've taken an increasing interest in growing some seedlings of my own, so





these also took up a larger proportion of my dahlia beds this year! *Fairplace Lesley* made a debut (then unnamed) appearance at Taunton. I suspect that it is not going to challenge the top varieties in the Medium Semi-Cactus category, but I have used it a fair bit during the 2024 season. I may see if I can push it up towards a large, where its loose petal formation could be less of a drawback. *Fairplace Amber* (unc miniature ball) is not very different in form to its seed parent *Mary's Jomanda* – but has a slightly brighter orange than *Jomanda*. *Fairplace Ruby* (unc miniature ball) is probably more of a cut flower or a garden variety – as it doesn't have a very dense petal count. But it seems bulletproof in the rain and sun – so I love it and have used it extensively in mixed display classes. The final registered/named variety for 2024 is *Fairplace Firecracker* (unc small cactus). It showed better form in the early part of the season, but needs to be covered as it bleaches. I need to have another try at growing in 2025 to see what I make of it. All four appeared at our early show in the three container displays I did. None of these varieties will, in all likelihood, make a mark at the National, but I've had a lot of fun raising them – which is what counts! A couple of 2024 seedlings and a sport look promising and will be grown for the 2025 season – watch this space!
